#### **Editorial**

In this edition we celebrate a NZ croquet super star in John Prince, who was inducted into the World Croquet Hall of Fame in 2007.

The Hall of Fame citation is elsewhere in the newsletter.

John passed away at the age of 77 in February this year. John was a life member of the United Club and the CCA.

We also celebrate a rising star in Patrick Conolly who recently won the Don Reyland Nationals.

An abridged commentary of the tournament a can be found elsewhere in the newsletter.

What do these two have in common?

John holds the MacRobertson Shield record by being the youngest player ever to compete, at the age of 17. (My research shows that this record still stands after 60 years.)

Patrick now holds the Don Reyland Tournament record by being the youngest player ever to win, at the age of 15.

## **Hall of Fame**

**John Prince** 

Born: 1945 Inducted: 2007





John Graham Prince commenced playing Croquet at the NaeNae Croquet Club situated in the Lower Hutt Hospital grounds in 1959 by sheer chance. As a 14-year old schoolboy, he had seen the game being played from the local swimming baths that overlooked the Lower Hutt Croquet Club in Riddiford He was intrigued and, Gardens. borrowing "Croquet Today" by Maurice Reckitt from the local library, became even more fascinated. He visited the NaeNae Club near his home and was fortunate to be invited to have a game by members Melba Miller and Muriel Palmer. Shortly afterwards, Ashley Heenan was approached and agreed to coach John.

John's croquet career took off when, aged 17 practically and with no tournament experience, he made a late debut into the 1963 New Zealand MacRobertson Shield team after winning his singles and doubles matches for a North Island team against the Australian visitors. He caused something of a sensation during the third Test Match between England and New Zealand when he defeated John Solomon, then universally the best player regarded as world. Interestingly, Solomon had himself been selected to play in the 1950/51 MacRobertson Shield against New Zealand when aged only 18 and with a similar lack of tournament experience!

John went on to reach the semi-finals of the 1963 New Zealand Open Championship where Solomon gained his revenge but, nonetheless gained his first national title when he won the New Zealand Men's Championship, in the process of which he defeated the English Test Match players

Humphrey Hicks in the semi-finals and Bryan Lloyd-Pratt in the final.

Over the following years, John amassed an impressive number of national titles, including eight New Zealand Open Championships, ten New Zealand Men's Championships and eight victories in the senior invitation event for the "Best Ten" or "Best Eight" players. He also won eleven New Zealand Doubles Championships and the British Open Doubles Championship in 1974.

In 1969, he was appointed captain of the New Zealand MacRobertson Shield for the first time and went on to do so on four further occasions including two Shield victories in 1979 and 1986. He holds three MacRobertson Shield records, namely by being the youngest player ever to compete, by playing in nine series and the first player to play 100 matches in the event.

On 30 March 1970, at Hastings during the final of the Hawkes Bay Easter Invitation John became the first player to complete a sextuple peel in a competition.

John's contribution to croquet was not confined to playing and winning major events. He was involved in attempts to Croquet, including publicize television demonstration in the days of black and white TV, and wrote several newspaper articles about the national Croquet scene. He served on the New Zealand Croquet Council for several years and was involved especially with international matters, selection for international and domestic events and tournament formats and conditions. provided illustrations for the CNZ publications "Approaching Croquet", and later wrote and illustrated "Practice with a Purpose", followed by a set of supplementary booklets. He was always keen to see that younger players and those who work were given as much opportunity to compete and so ensured the major events in New Zealand Croquet Council tournaments were played over weekends wherever possible.



Winning the MacRobertson Shield has always been John's top priority. Throughout his career, he has been constantly on the lookout for potential team members and has provided encouragement and support to up and coming New Zealand many One of his most players. significant contributions in this regard was his skilful mentoring of a very shy youngster called Paddy Chapman who is now one of the world's top ranked players.

# Patrick Conolly of Canterbury wins the Don Reyland Stars

Patrick Conolly (Canterbury) asserted himself as one of the most in-form young players in the country in a brilliant showing to win the 2023 Don Reyland Gold Star and trophy. The 21st Don Reyland Stars, and the first since the honorary's passing, was held at Rangatira CC in Dannevirke from 17-19 March. 16 players, with handicaps ranging from 0-12, all competed in best of 13 matches for the national Open Singles GC Handicap.

Friday would see Doug Cowie (Auckland), Mark Huttley (Wellington) and **Patrick Conolly** coming out of the first day with five wins out of five.

Cowie and **Conolly** continued their form into Saturday, winning their first three matches of the day. However, in the early afternoon, Huttley got a crucial 7-5 win over **Patrick Conolly**, while Cowie won his 9th straight game against Amy Gust. The three leaders all won their final match of the day to set up an exciting Sunday.

The opening round on Sunday would prove to be massive, with **Patrick Conolly** beating overnight leader Doug Cowie 7-6. In the 2nd last round of matches, Doug Cowie lost for only the second time of the week, 7-5 to Ricky Clement (South Taranaki), while **Conolly** won 7-5 against Barry Patchett, putting one hand on the trophy. However, **Patrick** knew that a victory would be needed in the final round as Doug had the better net hoops despite being a win behind.



#### Conolly was

able to show composure beyond his years, becoming the youngest ever winner of the Don Reyland Gold Star, after beating Kay Scrivener (South Canterbury) 7-4 in his final match. Doug Cowie secured the Silver Star, with a win over John Kane and finishing the week with an impressive 13 wins.

## Terminator Mallets U21 Championship

The Terminator Mallets U21 GC Championship was held at the Waireka Croquet Club in Ashburton over the Easter weekend. This year's tournament saw a significant increase in entries including a number of new players.

The doubles event saw 10 pairings compete in a single round robin, with the top four pairs qualifying for the best of three knockout. **Joel**Steele (Hawkes Bay) and **Levi Franks**

(Canterbury) finished top of the block with nine wins from nine. **James Duggan** and **Josh Winter** (both Canterbury) qualified for the other semifinal.

In the final **Duggan/Winter** won the first game 7:6 before **Steele/Franks** took control in game 2 winning 7:2. It was match on in game three going to hoop thirteen with either pair one hoop from the title. **Steele/Franks** held their nerve and managed to run the last hoop and win the title.

In the singles we saw 24 players competing in two sections of twelve played as a single round robin. The top four players in each section qualified for the Main knockout.

The quarterfinals saw Levi Franks, James Duggan (both Canterbury), and Nathan Bullen and Joel Steele prevailing, resulting in Franks having to play fellow Cashmere Croquet Club member **Duggan**. The two North Island players faced each other in the other semi-final. As fate would have it the two doubles winners emerged victorious to face each other in the final with the chance to add the singles title to their doubles title. Franks got off to a strong start winning the first two games in the best of five final 7:4 and 7:5 respectively before Steele took game three 7:6. This triggered renewed focus from Franks determined to avoid a fifth game, dominating the fourth game winning 7:1 and claiming the singles title.
