Congratulations Jenny!


Regular monthly social events during the season of afternoon tea and after-play drinks have been well attended by members and are an enjoyable social time.

USA eventually won the tournament with New Zealand placing fourth after a closely fought battle for a medal against Australia.

# Levi has written the following for our newsletter:

Competing in the 2025 Openshaw Shield was a fantastic experience, in terms of getting to witness the highest quality croquet anywhere on earth, growing closer to my New Zealand

teammates and making connections with a lot of awesome people from all over the world. Being the youngest member of the team it was my job to carry our mascot Kiwi with us to the croquet club each day. It was great to meet some legendary players and world champions who I could watch and learn from. Playing croquet in this high pressure team oriented environment is totally different from any croquet tournament I've played in before. It is great to have supportive teammates that have each other's backs when things don't go your way. I found the level of focus and precision that was needed to play well at this level was very exhausting to sustain, and every match, game and hoop that we won or lost was so much more important than any other competition. We were formally welcomed by the mayor of Launceston at the town hall, and then had two practice days where we got to warm up on the lawns and have a practice match against the Spanish team. Our first test match was against Australia which we lost 4-2, and I was definitely not playing my best. The next day we played England, which was a must-win test, and we stepped it up a notch and won 5-1. I personally played quite well and got some good wins in both doubles and singles. On day three we played a weaker Ireland team, as their previous results meant they could no longer make the knockout, so we had a comfortable 6-0 win. Unfortunately we lost in the semifinals to the USA over a two-day test match, which was pretty disappointing, as it only would have taken a few results to have swung our way for us to have had a chance at winning. I did pick up a pretty nice match win against the 2019 GC world champion Ben Rothman which was pretty cool. We then played Australia in a best of 9 test match for third place, and we barely lost 4-5, which again was pretty disappointing. But that's just how sport goes, I'm pretty happy with how well I played over the course of the event, and hopefully I'll be back again in four years time to have another crack at it.
